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MAY IT PLEASE THE INDEPENDENT HEARINGS PANEL:

 In Minute 3, the Panel sought information from Christchurch City Council (the Council) regarding various matters, including:

"a proposed detailed breakdown of sub-topics within each zone category in the table set out at paragraph 19 of Minute 3, with the number of submitters who have indicated that they wish to be heard that fall into these categories".

- 2. Counsel's memorandum dated 28 July 2023 addressed this request:
 - (a) at paragraphs 44 to 50; and
 - (b) in Appendix 2, which contained the Council's proposed detailed breakdown of sub-topics.
- Appendix 2 also contained indicative numbers of submissions on the
 provisions in PC14 relevant to each suggested sub-topic. Those numbers
 were subject to various limitations, explained briefly in the memorandum,
 such that they were not a reliable basis for the Panel to schedule the
 hearings for Plan Change 14 (PC14).
- 4. Following further analysis by the Council, **Appendix A** to this memorandum contains updated indicative numbers of submissions (of persons who wish to be heard) that relate to each of the topics specified by the Panel.
- 5. While this presents a clearer picture of the number of people who might wish to be heard in each hearing week, further information is nonetheless required before an accurate schedule can be prepared. The reasons why the numbers in Appendix A are not definitive include that:
 - (a) they are largely derived from the initial coding of submissions carried out by the Council, before the specific proposed sub-topics were identified;¹
 - (b) they aggregate the number of submissions coded against each of the topics identified by the Panel (but footnotes record where submissions were coded as having a focus on a suggested sub-topic);

(c) further submissions are still in the course of being coded and summarised (prior to being provided to the Panel on Friday, 4 August 2023), and are not currently reflected in the numbers; and

(d) over 1,000 submissions and further submissions have been made on PC14, the relevant parts of the coding exercise and subsequent analysis relate to the submissions of several hundred submitters who wish to be heard, and both exercises have been carried out in condensed timeframes.

6. Further, as noted in counsel's memorandum of 28 July 2023, the allocation of each submission to one or more sub-topics involves judgement and may not

reflect the preference of a submitter.

7. Counsel note paragraph 49 of the Panel's draft hearing procedures, which envisages submitters appearing once to present their submission on all topics, wherever practical, and being invited to elect to present at the hearing topic most relevant to their submission points. In terms of next steps, subject to the views of the Panel and submitters at the pre-hearing meeting, the Panel may wish to direct that each submitter (wishing to be heard) advise the

Secretariat, by a nominated date, of:

each hearing topic and sub-topic, from the Panel's approved list, to (a)

which their submission relates:

any (known) witness the submitter intends to call in relation to each (b)

topic and sub-topic; and

any preferred hearing week(s) in which the submitter wishes to present (c)

its case.
